The View From Here

A Message from Matt Shappell, District Administrator

Like most folks, when Superintendents get together we talk shop. We always seem to talk about the same topics: finances, student and staff safety, how to retain great teachers, and student achievement. Eventually someone will bring up "snow days" and the group lets out a collective groan. Smartphones come out and weather apps are compared, phone numbers get shared, and we rank local meteorologists on their timeliness, accuracy, and their tendencies to turn a chance for flurries into the latest "snow-mageddon" event. Someone will share a "when I was a kid" story about how their school district never cancelled school for kids who walked -- buses yes, but not walkers. To an outsider, this may look like a casual gathering, but it is the first of many collective conversations about how to keep students safe and keep families informed.

These decisions are never easy; we understand that a decision to close or delay impacts families -- and we try to stay open whenever we can. That's why we work to gather as much information as possible: we talk to our bus company, law enforcement, highway department(s), and even subscribe to a local professional meteorologist's service to provide a local forecast.

Weather forecasting has gotten much better since the "when I was a kid" days. Predictions are more accurate than ever before. The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Agency (NOAA) provides us with up-to-date information via their National Weather Service branch and local media outlets present various forecasts.

Weather is not an exact science. Even The National Weather Service speaks in estimates:

WIND CHILL ADVISORY AND WARNING THRESHOLDS......

-ROUGHLY...THE NORTHERN HALF OF WISCON-SIN WILL HAVE AN ADVISORY THRESHOLD OF -25 AND A WARNING THRESHOLD OF -35. HOWEVER...SOME OF THE NORTHWEST COUNTIES HAVE AN ADVISORY

THRESHOLD OF -25 AND A WARNING THRESHOLD OF -40.

-ROUGHLY...THE SOUTHERN HALF OF WISCON-SIN WILL HAVE AN ADVISORY THRESHOLD OF -20 AND A WARNING THRESHOLD OF -35.

A "wind chill warning" (not advisory) usually has impact on our school day. The same can be said of Winter Storm Warnings, Ice Storm Warnings, and Blizzard Warnings. But there are times when there are no warnings and buses struggle with fuel gelling, or there is drifting snow that impacts our transportation routes. Those events can cause delays or cancellations as well.

Because our school district encompass approximately 100 square miles of land that includes the Arlington Prairie and the Lake Wisconsin area, weather can vary even within our district boundaries. We may have passable roads in Poynette, but the Arlington area rural roads may be drifted and inpassible. We have to consider conditions in all areas of the district when we are making a delay or closing decision.

We try to make our decisions early, so the automated call goes out before 6:00 am. As a rule of thumb, if we close, evening events are cancelled. If we delay, the morning session of four-year -old kindergarten is cancelled as well.

To help with the communication process, it is important for families to have their contact information up to date in Infinite Campus. The District relies on that information to send alerts for closures and modifications to the school day. Please contact a building secretary if you'd like assistance with setting up an account.

Of course, if a parent feels their local conditions warrant keeping their child home or sending him or her later in the day, that's a decision we completely respect. We ask that you please contact the school like any other absence.

Winter is a wonderful time in Wisconsin. Being prepared for the season is important -- it requires the proper gear and the proper information.

Seniors should be completing applications to colleges and universities now if you haven't already done so. Remember that a complete application includes a transcript and an ACT score as well so make sure you have requested those from the high school and ACT. Please contact the counseling office if you are having difficulties doing that. Housing applications will be arriving in the near future. Make sure to complete and send those applications back in a timely manner to get your first choice if you plan to live on campus next year.

Hopefully, you have also completed the FAFSA (Federal Application For Student Aid). If not, you still have time to get that completed. You can do this online at www.fafsa. gov. Many colleges will have priority deadlines that are in December, January or early February so don't wait to get that application done. Remember, you should not have to pay anything to complete this form. Fafsa.com & fafsa. org WILL charge you to complete the fafsa. Only access the application at www.fafsa.gov. If you have questions, or need assistance completing the application, contact the school counselors at the high school at 635-4347 ext. 404 or ext. 314.

If your student is required to take placement testing for college next fall you will receive information on that. Testing usually takes place from January through March or early April. If required, be sure to sign up early to get your desired date and location.

Local scholarship applications will be made available to students in December and those applications will be due in the counseling office on February 15th.

Juniors should be thinking about making those college campus visits this spring. This is a great time to begin narrowing your college choices to keep your applications in check. Remember that the required ACT Test is fast approaching. All Juniors will be taking the ACT on Wednesday, February 20th, and the Workkeys Assessment on Thursday, February 21st.

Conferencing for all Freshmen and Juniors is taking place now. Contact Mr. Anderson to schedule your Freshman Connections Conference or Mrs. Sukowski to schedule your Junior Connections Conference.

Nurse's Report

Head Lice: What Parents Need to Know

Head lice are a common problem that usually affects school-aged children and their families. They can attach to the hair of anyone's head. It doesn't matter if the hair is clean or dirty. Head lice are also found worldwide in all different places, such as in homes or schools or the country or city. And it doesn't matter how clean, dirty, rich, or poor the place or person is.

Though head lice may be a nuisance, they don't cause serious illness or carry any diseases. Head lice can be treated at home, but it's important to check with the doctor first.

What are head lice?

Head lice are tiny bugs about the size of a sesame seed (2–3 mm long [mm stands for millimeter]). Their bodies are usually pale and gray, but their color may vary. One of these tiny bugs is called a louse. Head lice feed on small amounts of blood from the scalp. They can usually live 1 to 2 days without blood meal. Lice lay and attach their eggs to hair close to the scalp. The eggs and their shell casings are called nits. They are oval and about the size of a knot in thread (0.8 mm long and 0.3 mm wide) and usually yellow to white. Some nits may blend in with some people's hair color, making them hard to see, and are often confused for dandruff or hair spray droplets. Head lice live about 28 days. They develop in 3 phases: egg (also called a nit), nymph, and adult louse.

How common are head lice?

Head lice are most common in preschool- and elementary school-aged children. Each year millions of school-aged children in the United States get head lice. However, anyone can get head lice. Head lice are found worldwide.

How do head lice spread?

Head lice are crawling insects. They cannot jump, hop, or fly. The main way head lice spread is from close, prolonged

head-to-head contact. There is a very small chance that head lice will spread by sharing items such as combs, brushes, and hats.

How do you treat head lice?

Check with your child's doctor before beginning any head lice treatment. The most effective way to treat head lice is with head lice shampoo, which can be bought over-the-counter. Always follow the directions completely when using the shampoo. After shampooing hair, using a hair dryer set on medium helps kill lice also. After each treatment, using the comb-out method every 2 to 3 days for 2 to 3 weeks may help remove the nits and eggs.

What else do I need to know about treating head lice?

- You may want to wash your child's clothes, towels, hats, and bed linens in hot water and dry on high heat if they were used within 2 days before head lice were found and treated. You do not need to throw these items away. Items ,such as stuffed animals, that cannot be washed may be dry-cleaned or sealed in a plastic bag for 2 weeks. Don't forget to vacuum your car if you have cloth seats.
- Do not spray pesticides in your home. They can expose your family to dangerous chemicals and are not needed when you treat your child's scalp and hair properly.
- All household members and close contacts should also be checked and treated if necessary.



Special thanks to these two firemen for taking time to make our students' lunch times special!









PHS Fine Arts Weekend



Season Game Passes

Season athletic passes for students and adults may be purchased at the high school office or at upcoming high school games. Investing in a pass is both convenient and economical for those sports fans who regularly attend high school games. Passes are only valid for the name listed on the pass.

Passes cost \$30 for adults and \$10 for students. (Regular admission price for adults is \$4 and \$3 for students in grades K-12.).

Passes are accepted at all regular season home high school games this school year including football, volleyball, basketball and wrestling competitions.

Golden Years Passes

The Golden Years Passes (if you are age 65+, or 62+ and retired) are available at the high school office for our senior sports fans. The pass holder must be a resident of our school district. Passes are available at the high school office.

Athletic Cards and Fee Reminder

Student athletes participating in sports must complete an alternate year card or physical card before beginning practice sessions. Forms are available at the school offices. Athletic fees need to be paid at the school office before the first contest and are not refundable. Grades 6-8 fee is \$25, and grades 9-12 fee is \$50 (per sport season per student).
